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Respect for Persons/Autonomy Acknowledge a person's right to make choices, to hold views, and to take actions based on personal values and beliefs Justice Treat others equitably, distribute benefits/burdens fairly. Nonmaleficence (do no harm) Obligation not to inflict harm intentionally; In medical ethics, the physician's guiding maxim is "First, do no harm."

Principles — Respect, Justice, Nonmaleficence, Beneficence

The three basic principles are (1) respect for persons, (2) beneficence, and (3)

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justice. In this context, the principle of beneficence is understood as an abstract norm that includes derivative rules such as "Do no harm," "Balance benefits against risks," and "Maximize possible benefits and minimize possible harms."

The Principle of Nonmaleficence The principle of nonmaleficence requires of us that we not intentionally create a harm or injury to the patient, either through acts of commission or omission. In common language, we consider it negligent if one imposes a careless or unreasonable risk of harm upon another.

Conflicts between principles cannot be resolved without reference to the situation where they are applied. They have described four principles as essential for biomedical ethics: respect for autonomy, nonmaleficence, beneficence, and justice. Respect for autonomy. Autonomy derives from the Greek *autos nomos*, meaning self- rule. Beauchamp and Childress define personal autonomy as “personal rule of the self, free from both controlling interferences by others and from personal limitations ...

It is based on four principles: 1. Respect for autonomy, 2. Nonmaleficence, 3. Beneficence, and. 4. Justice. and these are assumed to be rooted in a “common morality”, which is “not relative to cultures or individuals, because it transcends both” (Beauchamp & Childress, 2009d).

The term “principlism” designates an approach to biomedical ethics that uses a framework of four universal and basic ethical principles: respect for autonomy, nonmaleficence, beneficence, and justice. It is presented and defended in Beauchamp and Childress’ *Principles of Biomedical Ethics*. The basic principles state *prima facie* (or non-absolute) moral obligations that are rendered practical by being specified for particular contexts.
